anuary 22-24, 2017. Our Michigan ministry team made up of pastors and Bible workers, together with conference administrators and department leaders, met at Camp Au Sable for one of our bi-annual ministry retreats. There were about 260 leaders and their family members in attendance. With 120 pastors and Bible workers scattered all over Michigan, these retreats provide opportunity for continuing education, planning, coordination, fellowship, and a little exercise and recreation.

The retreat began on Sunday afternoon with a meeting of conference administrators and district superintendents. Following supper, the opening session commenced with introductions of new pastors and Bible workers, followed by singing of good-old gospel hymns, and a special presentation by Elder Gallimore. Each of the following mornings began at 7:00 AM with morning worship, which included more singing, a season of prayer, and a devotional by one of our pastors. Pastor David Gotshall of Stevensville remarked that he especially appreciated the time for focused prayer during the morning worships.

Each morning and evening, the continuing-education component was provided by Dr. Clinton Wahlen of the Bible Research Institute of the General Conference. His presentations covered principles of biblical hermeneutics. Wahlen revealed how the Christian world has used several different methods to interpret the Bible. He explained that the historical-grammat-

Behind the Scenes Michigan Camp Meeting

CAMP MEETING SUPERINTENDENT

ur Michigan camp meeting has been a blessing to the constituents of the Michigan Conference from the 1930s. What's true of camp meeting, held in the early years at Grand Ledge and currently at Cedar Lake, is that a lot goes into the preparation of the 9-day event. The preparation for camp meeting is completed almost entirely by the pastors and Bible workers of the Michigan Conference, along with some laity.

The preparation begins in August, just two months after the previous camp meeting. The directors from the major departments meet nine times throughout the year to review, dream, and plan on how to improve from the last one. In these meetings major decisions are made, which include logistics, the theme, cart assignments, stage décor, safety management, and other important items.

By mid-January, six large tents are ordered, which cost around \$15,000. These tents are the worship locations for Kindergarten 2, Junior 2, Teens, and the Youth. A special tent is set up near the Mobile Kitchen for attendees to eat their tasty food or to simply rest in the shade. The largest tent—the big top—located behind the Fitness Center is home to our departmental and guest exhibit booths. A total of 41 booths are set up to display and encourage people to get involved in all types of ministry. Nothing is sold in our ministry-exhibit tent, but you will find free giveaways that include books, pencils/pens, balloons, squishy-balls, and lemonade, to name a few. We've had a few chicks hatched in this tent as well!

Two to three weeks prior to camp

meeting, preparations begin on the grounds in Cedar Lake. First our A/V team moves in to set up the screens, cameras, sound system, projectors, and more. Next our fitness center team moves in to lay the vinyl flooring and properly mark it. Next, Great Lakes Adventist Academy (GLAA) students led by coach Ted Webster set up the staging and chairs for graduation. The collaboration between GLAA and the Michigan Conference pastors is a treat to witness. The result of this early setup allows for an upgrade to GLAA's graduation with a full screen video projection and the camp meeting A/V setup!

About a week out, the parking team moves in to set the "corner stone" markings of the tent stakes. Remember, these are all pastors leading the teams in the prework. Another team moves in to set up the temporary water lines for the campers in the primitive areas. These lines must be cleaned and sanitized, and a water sample is taken and sent to a lab in Grand Rapids to make sure the water quality is perfect. It is not the Water of life, but it is clean water!

The 10 months of planning converges upon the largest part of the implementation process—the Sunday before camp meeting—affectionately named "Camp Pitch" amongst the pastoral force. Pastors, Bible Workers, and lay people arrive Sunday night from all over our great state! The tents go up, trailers are set, screen houses pitched, and many smiles and hugs are shared as everyone greets one another in anticipation of the wonderful two weeks together.

The Monday morning of Camp Pitch is orientation and prayer time. Robust



singing and worship are a daily occurrence for the families in attendance. After worship, each pastor is assigned a task or two to set up the "Adventist town" on the grounds of GLAA. Teams of pastors lay out and mark over 250 camp sites; another team tests and fixes each campground electrical box; another group sets the stage, the curtains, and banners; some clean the dormitories and every building; pastors' wives take on the task of cleaning the campground restrooms, cabins, and cottages.

The lawn mowing team as you might imagine is also very active. A weed whipping team trims hundreds of trees and electrical posts to make it look crisp. Several teams eyeball the rows of fence stakes to ensure it's perfectly straight so that when people see the fences and streamers, they understand this is for the people of God. Others deliver chairs, backdrops, screens, stages, and toys, among other items, to the children's divisions.

If you take the time to observe, you will notice individuals picking up the smallest bits of paper or debris from the grounds so that it looks just right. The trams are cleaned and serviced for their daily duties.

As you can see, there are many moving parts in setting up the campground. But we're not done yet! On Monday the golf carts come in, and in the evening a Michigan family picnic/softball/soccer game is held. On Tuesday the tents go up and the day ends with a special camp meeting prayer session. On Wednesday the pastors that lead the children's divisions are released to set up their divisions, and

the day closes with the entire team meeting together for the camp meeting orientation. It is crucial that we all know what's going

By God's grace and the Spirit's leading the campground is ready when everyone arrives. The great and anticipated event will have finally arrived!

When it's all said and done, about 1,148 stakes are pounded; 2.5 miles of streamers are hung; 4,500 feet of fencing are established; 3,000 chairs are set up; 1,200 batteries are utilized for microphones and recorders; 275 hours of seminars are ready to go; 500 hours of children and youth programming are prepared; numerous trees are trimmed; countless blades of grass are cut; 4,100 gallons of chloride are placed on the campground roads; not to mention the thousands of prayers that have gone up seeking God's blessing and direction.

All this is done for one reason—to create an environment where God can speak to His people. During the week and especially on Sabbath, invitations are made for individuals to commit or recommit their lives to Christ; and if they haven't already, to seal those decisions in baptism. Each year we have seen the Holy Spirit at work—kids, youth, young and seasoned adults—making public confessions and decisions for Christ. In addition, attendees are equipped for active ministry and the spiritual fellowship strengthens everyone in their dedication to Jesus. When we see this, we know it's worth all the effort!

This is Pure Michigan. This is GROW Michigan. This is Michigan Camp Meeting!

ical method is the only one consistent with correct Biblical understanding. It allows the Bible to be its own interpreter. One pastor stated, "I was thankful for the opportunity to have Clinton Wahlen with us. His presentations were very practical and helpful showing how individuals can come to different conclusions in scripture." Pastor Mike Wise of the Hillsdale and Pittsford churches said, "I especially enjoyed the messages by Dr. Wahlen. Whenever we have a Spirit-led understanding of the hermeneutics of Scripture we are led to. . . . God's truth, wherever it takes us."

The rest of the morning was work time. Our conference district superintendents met with their districts for planning and event coordination, and our camp meeting teams gathered to get ready for the next Cedar Lake camp meeting. In addition, our conference departments shared their plans for upcoming events including

Biblestudyoffer.com and our next *Unlock Revelation series*.



anuary 24-28, 2017, a special Emmanuel Institute training program, "An Army of Youth: Combating Cultural Christianity," was held on the campus of Great Lakes Adventist Academy (GLAA). The goal was to initiate revival and reformation by leading the students through the biblical foundations of their faith. Eighty-eight students and staff sacrificed their January home leave to participate in four days of intense Bible instruction.

The session began Tuesday morning as Pastor Mark Howard, director of the



Emmanuel Institute, jump-started the day with the essentials of Christian life, including personal devotional time with God. Throughout the week, the scriptural foundations of many key doc-

trines such as the Sanctuary, the Sabbath, the remnant, the 2300-day prophecy, the three angels messages', and Christian lifestyle were presented by pastors Kameron DeVasher, Daniel Jean-Francois, Taylor Hinkle, Mark Howard, Wes Peppers, and Joe Reeves.

Caleb, a junior at GLAA, reflected on the blessings: "I learned a ton! It was really good to learn about the Great Controversy, [the teachers] went into detail, but it was still super easy to understand." As the week progressed, students were engaged and convicted.

On Friday evening Pastor Wes Peppers shared his powerful testimony, "The Atheist Who Found God." During the final appeal, the Holy Spirit prompted "fireworks" as he challenged students to go and bring back items that stood between them and God. In the center of campus, a fire was ablaze in a barrel where students and staff huddled together as smoke billowed from the discarded books, clothing, and even cell phones. Tears were shed as one student watched the pages of her troubled past go up in flames, burning away her journal page by page. The powerful truths of God's Word had ignited a revival that was made evident in commitment and action.

On Sabbath morning Dr. Clinton Wahlen of the Biblical Research Institute was added to a question and answer panel. Students asked probing questions about Christian lifestyle, interpersonal relationships, God and salvation, and determining God's will. During the worship service, students and staff shared personal testimonies.

Nakeysha, a sophomore, explained how God revealed that she could not continue to hold on to "earthly things" such as certain books, music, and social media, and still put Him first. That afternoon, the staff and students drove to Mount Pleasant and discovered over 20 people interested in Bible studies. Many students recommitted themselves to God, requesting baptism and rebaptism. Several staff members reported that they had never seen anything like this and that it was the most uplifting spiritual experience that they had ever had.
